At Langley Fitzurse we focus on six values throughout the year. This term we have explored friendship and have enjoyed some excellent discussions during Collective Worship and times within our classes.

One particular question which has been thought provoking to us all has been 'Do we have to be friends with someone to show kindness?' The resounding answer from all was 'absolutely not! But sometimes through acts of kindness friendships can grow.'

We talked about how those acts of kindness effect not only the recipient but also the giver;

And how kindness can have a ripple and snowball effect for good.

We even went online and searched 'act of kindness' - so many videos, and so many examples tumbled from the AI Bot! We then went on to challenged ourselves to evaluate using our hearts, minds and hands. This is something that we try do to in all collective worship.

Beau is Saying Hello!


This is Beau, he is Stanton's adopted school dog and visits Stanton on days when Mrs Winterburn is at Stanton. He is also part of the Winterburn family. Sometimes, when Mrs Winterburn is working across the 2 schools during a day he has been coming into Langley Fitzurse, often saying hello to the children and staff and generally joining in in the hub of the school day.

Most of the children have met Beau and indeed some of our parents too. We would like to officially introduce him to the wider school community so that you are not surprised if your child mentions Beau being in school or you meet him should you pop in.

Beau is a bit of an old man now, being 12 years old. He is brilliant with the children and adults, loves attention, a walk and a treat! He has termly vets checks so we make sure we

are bringing a healthy dog into school. Beau is a Lakeland/Patterdale terrier and so malting in minimal. This means that in terms of allergies and asthma for humans he is less likely to create a reaction.

Our intention is that Beau will become part of our school community, not every day but sometimes, as we have seen through first hand experience the benefit of animals on a person's well being. We do fully recognise that this is not the case for all and so will be sending home a brief questionnaire after the half term break to understand your child's experience and feelings around dogs. We will formally introduce Beau through class visits and talk to the school about safe ways in approaching animals together with personal health and hygiene. There are some excellent resources we have used in the past on the Dogs Trust website.



School Uniform

It has been great to witness the children's enthusiasm and eagerness to get stuck into what they can do as representatives of their classes. We have talked about how to improve our play-times. The children already had all sorts of ideas but are now going to gather more from their classmates to bring to our next meeting in Tear 2. We are also expecting to talk to a visitor in November to discuss the other outside areas and how these can be developed.

Parking

Thank you for your support in recent communications ref parking in the village. This has enabled the bus easier access, has meant that our after school club teachers are able to park, and staff are able to leave on time.

When dropping off and collecting your child from school please use the pavement to the right of the drive and do not walk across the driveway leading to the school gates. road This is important for everyone's safety and will also help to teach your child road safety too. May we also remind parents to be considerate to the safety of the children and to other road users and residents by remembering the following:

- Please park considerately in the village and do not park across driveways or at the entrance to our school.
- Please be aware that the bus struggles to get through if too many cars are parked in the layby by the church
- Please drive slowly through the village as there are many pedestrians about
- No children should be left at school unaccompanied at the school gates before 8:40am.

The gravel driveway in front of the Chapel is private property. This needs to be kept clear as it is a shared driveway to the house behind. There have been instances where the people who live there have had a reverse onto the main road as cars have stopped them from turning on their driveway. As I am sure you will all agree, this is not very safe, especially at peak times when parked cars often block the view of oncoming traffic.





School Clubs

As part of a review of our PE curriculum, we are very excited to be working with Bath Lacrosse in Term 2 and Term 4. This will mean that Mr Roberts will teaching our Key Stage 2 children how to play Pop Lacrosse on Monday afternoons, where each class will have one of their PE lessons at the Village Rec.

For Term 2 all Key Stage 2 children will need to come to school in their PE kit on Mondays. As it will be the winter months it may be wet/muddy so please expect that children may come home a little mucky! Older trainers rather than new will be a good call too!

School trips and visits

KS2 Bristol Museum and Art Gallery—KS2 had a wonderful trip into Bristol on Thursday 10th October to visit the Bristol Museum.

As part of our topic on Ancient Greece, we got involved in Workshops run by the museum staff where we could get close up to actual ancient artefacts. We became archaeologists as we learnt about how these objects, their decorations and functions that told us about the past.

We also had time exploring some of the other exhibits in the museum including Ancient Egypt (our Term 3 topic), dinosaur fossils, and rare and endangered animals.

The children represented our school excellently and we comments from the museum staff to support this. Thank you to all of our adult helpers on the day to make it a special day out for our children.



Year 1+2 Multi Skills Event— The Primary Multi-Skills was is a dynamic and engaging morning designed to introduce the children to a wide range of physical activities and sports. The goal is to develop fundamental movement skills, such as agility, balance, coordination, and teamwork, in a fun and supportive environment. By providing a variety of challenges, this event en-


courages children to improve their physical abilities and confidence, setting the foundation for lifelong participation in sports.

During the event, the children participated in multiple activity stations, each focused on a different skill set. These stations included:

- Relay Races that promote teamwork and speed.
- Obstacle Courses to enhance coordination and balance.
- Throwing and Catching Challenges for hand-eye coordination.
- Jumping and Running Drills to build agility and endurance.

The multi-skills approach emphasises versatility, ensuring that children develop the essential skills needed for a wide range of sports. This format allows them to explore their abilities, discover new interests, and gain confidence in their physical potential.

The multi-skills promotes important values such as sportsmanship, cooperation, and perseverance. The children work together in teams, learning how to support and motivate one another while enjoying the friendly competition. The focus is on participation and effort, rather than winning, which helps create a positive atmosphere where every child feels included and encouraged.



KS1 Chepstow Castle

On Wednesday, 16th October, Pegasus and Hercules children went to Chepstow Castle. The weather didn't look very promising, but we were brave enough to face up to the challenge! After the excitement of boarding the coach we soon headed along the motorway towards Wales, crossing the Severn Bridge. Arriving in Chepstow we were awed by the sight of the castle, its impressive, high walls rising into the cloudy sky. At this point it wasn't yet raining!

Once we had entered the castle, children soon were able to identify arrow slits, battlements, the moat and a portcullis. We were able to enjoy an enchanting view of the River Wye, cocooned by tufts of mist. Soon it started to rain quite heavily and we decided to have our lunch in the Education Rooms that were provided. Here we had great fun doing a variety of activities, such as archery and jousting (a very nasty dragon had crept into the castle!). Soon it was time to head home, and whilst it was a wet day, we had great fun. Thank you to the parent volunteers for accompanying us, as well as the PTA for their financial contribution.



Guinness World Record Attempt

On Thursday 3rd October it was National Poetry Day. Key Stage 2 celebrated this by joining over 1,000 schools to try and break a Guinness World Record for the largest poetry lesson (multi venues).
