As a school we believe:

- Home learning should support the learning happening in class.
- It will be a blended approach—online and paper based.
- It should not be set as a time filler .
- Should be sustainable—teachers are able to set appropriate home learning, but not to the detriment of planning and preparation of Teaching and Learning in class.
- There should be consistency in how and when Home Learning is set
- There is an expectation that children complete tasks to the best that they can.

What will happen next?

Teachers are currently writing a summary/class offer for their class' of what Home Learning tasks will be set on a weekly and/or term basis . This will then be shared with children and parents by the end of November.



Christian Distinctiveness at Langley Fitzurse School

Week 3: Christian value – Bible stories & the teaching of Jesus Valuing others as we would like to be valued - Anti bullying week

At Langley Fitzurse Church of England School, we explore our values through Bible stories and the teachings of Jesus. One of the important things that Jesus did was to break down social, cultural and religious barriers. **Read Luke 10:25–37. The Parable of the Good Samaritan**

This story from the Bible makes it clear that people (including those who are different from us) are equally valuable and that we should treat others with care and respect. Jesus told this story to illustrate what it means to keep one of God's commandments in the Bible: *Love your neighbour as you love yourself.*' Luke 10:27(NCV).



Think about how you treat others – including those who aren't your friends or whom you don't like. You might like to share this prayer:

Dear God, help us to remember that everyone is important, that everyone has something to offer. Help us to remember that everyone deserves respect and to be treated with consideration, no matter what country or religion or background they are from. Help us to make the world a better place by treating everyone with courtesy, fairness and respect. Amen
