Term 5: Perseverance

Christian value – Bible stories & the teaching of Jesus

At Langley Fitzurse Church of England School we explore our values through Bible stories and the teachings of Jesus. Read together Luke 18: 1 – 8 The Parable of the Widow Who Never Gives Up.

Jesus told this story to encourage people to keep praying – BUT it doesn't mean if we keep nagging God he will finally give in and give us what we want! It's not about getting our personal wishes and wants. The widow is vulnerable and alone. She has been cheated or wronged in some way but is determined to ask for justice – she is fighting for what is right and fair.

God is nothing like the judge. He is full of love, compassion and kindness, and is willing and ready to hear the prayers of his people when they ask him for justice.

This parable encourages us to persevere in praying for justice for ourselves and for all people around the world. It inspires us not to lose heart, even when it seems that nothing in the world will ever change.

And prayer and action often go together. What might God be calling YOU to do to help seek fairness and justice for all? If we were as persistent as the widow in seeking justice what would our world look like then?
