Dear Parents

Thank you to those who completed the recent parent questionnaire regarding Relationships and Sex Education. For this feedback we received 64 responses which we take as family responses. We feel this is a well-supported response rate and we appreciate the time you have taken to complete our questions.

Parents were asked 5 quick questions together with an open text response. Please see below a summary:

XXX talks about relationships and growing up after discussions at school.

XXX has spoken about the physical differences between boys & girls XXX has learned in school & I think for XXX age that is appropriate. We live on a farm so understands male & females make babies together & where babies come out & has seen the animals mating but never asked how humans do it. For XXX age I think the school is teaching XXX appropriately.
We are happy for XXX to be taught about sex and relationships at school. We continue to support XXX education at home.
More information on PHSE subject needed.
Personally at this age (KS1) I think children should be learning about boundaries before any specific relationship/ sex topics are approached. Respecting your own and other people's boundaries is the fundamental ground work needed to foster healthy relationships in the future. I would therefore only like to see more work around teaching children about their own boundaries in relation to their bodies. The pant song from Barnardo's is a good start but also songs and games that revolve around loving our bodies just the way they are and the what our bodies are for and do so that when the conversation moves on, they have the knowledge and emotional intelligence to deal with it.
Both our XXX know they can ask any questions if they ever have any or discuss anything at all and they do so.
More information on the curriculum would be great, thank you.

I am not sure what XXX heard about this subject in school, as she doesn't tell us a lot about what XXX learns in school. XXX does ask questions, but as I have discussed these things with XXX from a young age I'm not sure whether it's related to what XXX heard in school or a continuation of our discussion or just something that came up naturally.

Curriculum maps are published each term for each class. These highlight the areas of the curriculum which are to be taught and explored the following term. Where in the past these have been sent directly to parents through ParentMail, these are now published on the class pages of the website and a link to it is also sent out.

Also on the PSHE Curriculum Page of our Website there are 2 excellent documents which explain the Learning Journey for Growing and Changing from Early Years to Year 6; and the RSE Policy which explains how Relationships are explored as a progression by age. [PSHE - Welcome To Langley Fitzurse](#)
